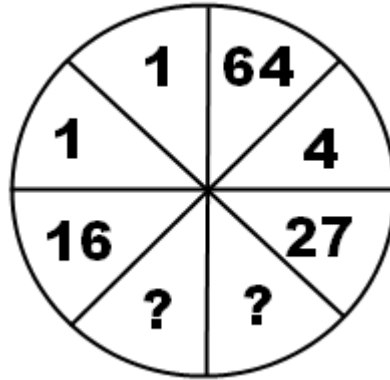

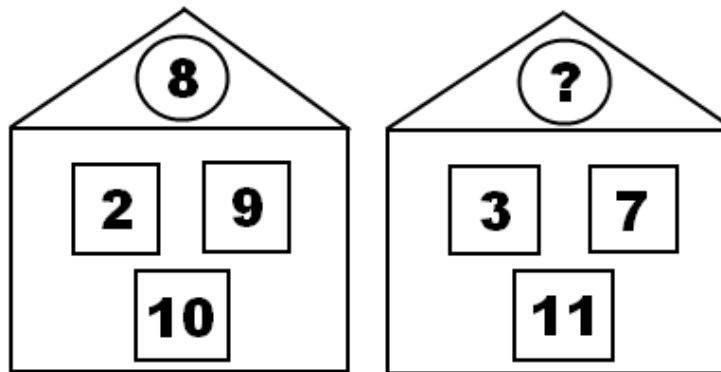

Part 3.

Analyze the case below in terms of psychological mechanisms.

The psychologist Edward Titchener believed that to study a human mind, one needs to determine its structure and components. In his theory, mind structure included sensation, perception and bare feeling, for example, if something is pleasant or unpleasant. In his opinion, our entire mental life is made up of these components. Imagine a situation where two observers, one of whom is experienced in introspection, taste an exotic fruit for the first time ever. Edward Titchener believed that one needed special training to be able to tell the different components of the mind structure from one another.
